January 2023 Parish Letter

I've been the Vicar of Great Barton and Thurston for over a year now. And I love it! I've been thinking about the New Year ahead, and what I might look to next as I serve you as the vicar of your churches.

A couple of things I hear quite often in conversation with people is the phrase, 'I'm spiritual but not religious' and 'I'd like to come to church, but I've no idea what's going on!'

To the first of those, well I can't hand on heart say I'm not religious! The collar is a bit of a giveaway! But I would say that actually I can get on board with that. Quite often in our lives, we feel that there is something missing – even when we feel pretty content with our lives, there's something else going on that leaves us wanting. I remember my Nan, who wasn't a churchgoer herself, when we talked about my faith, saying, "I don't know what it is, but I believe in SOMETHING. I've never been sure, but SOMETHING is here, next to me, with me".

Now, of course I'd *love* everyone to come to church and learn about that 'something', that divine force that is alongside us, listening, guiding and calling to us – the Universe, the Architect, the Blueprint, Mother Nature, God – whatever you call it and however you experience it. But I get that for so many, Christianity is a whole other language, a whole other culture that just seems alien!

One of the things I'm looking to do next year is to cut through some of the jargon (the 'Christianese'!) with some services where you can come along and learn what it's all about — Why do we have bread and wine? What do I do during prayers? What's with all the candles? When do I stand up/sit down? What's the difference between a cassock and a hassock? All those things about church that just seem a bit bonkers — we'll have some services that will explain all of that so that it's less scary and you haven't got to worry about doing the wrong thing or being the wrong person — everyone is welcome in our churches.

And what about if you still don't fancy coming to a church service yet, but really want to explore that 'something', that feeling that there is more to this life than your job or that holiday or that dream home or winning the lottery? There's something you believe in but can't quite grasp? I'd love to talk to you about it – not because I want to convince you about Christianity, although that's the experience I speak from, but to share our ideas of what our faith is and how it informs *our* lives and our lives as part of these communities – I'll be looking to find some spaces and places for informal discussions about all things faith, the sacred, the divine and what it means for you.

I look forward to this year ahead, of being part of these two great communities, these beautiful villages, welcoming those who are part of the village furniture and those of you who have recently arrived — both villages have lots of change in the air, but I think one thing will remain the same; the community spirit that is abundant in both Barton and Thurston — the belonging. You have all made my family and I feel that we belong — and I want you to know that you belong in your churches too.

So as this New Year comes, let's embrace that spirit of newness, exploring our spiritual selves and embrace that deep tradition that was ours all along, discovering anew what our churches have to offer. And as the dawn breaks on a new year, let us give thanks for all we hold dear: our family and our friends — each other. God bless you all.

One of My Favourite Things....

is sharing stories of friends and acquaintances from the past.

Last October I wrote about Dorothy Lawrence, and her insistence that we turned all the cup handles the same direction in the Church Institute.

Dorothy also ran the Sunday School in 1971. There were nearly 80 children in the Sunday School, which was held in the very cooooold church. There were about six classes, divided by ages. Three days after moving to Gt. Barton, we came to church with June Marsom, who, with husband Paul, had the Post Office, and were our landlords.

Two or three Sundays later, Dorothy announced that the Sunday School was short a couple of teachers, and that she would like volunteers to fill those vacancies. As three of the children were ours, I told her that I would be glad to be a "supply teacher", to fill-in when a teacher was ill or away.

Dorothy was delighted and asked me to come the next Sunday. I turned up and was assigned the 8–10-year old's class. There were no lesson plans, no materials of any kind at all, and definitely no part-time teachers!

When the PCC decided that Sunday School should be at the same time as the main service to encourage parents to come to church, Sunday School, now smaller, was held in the Children's Corner, and up the North Isle. But that was very disturbing for the congregation. Then we moved into the tower bell-ringing chamber. The children loved it, but Health and Safety shut that down. Then we were in the porch for years. (Very drafty.) At different periods we were in the Institute, or the school, or the Vestry. Now we are back in the school with Together Café Church.

Dorothy was a strong character, and certainly had a great effect on my life in Gt. Barton, as I continued to teach Sunday School until Covid stopped all church activities.

This week I had a lovely letter from Jill Cooper telling me some of her memories of Dorothy, and many other people from our past. She said in part, ".... many times, I have recalled the cups in the cupboard, handles facing forwards. I think we all suffered the Sergeant Major's wrath! However, I also remember her as a good friend, when Jim and I spent many a happy evening with Dorothy in her home."

Jill mentioned Mary Curtis, Frank Aldous, Irene and Cyril Wade, John Baker, Derek and Janet Hill – each name bringing back my own memories. Jill concluded, "I feel very honoured not only to have known these people but to remember they have been part of my life."

It has occurred to me since getting Jill's letter, that we could continue this sharing of memories quite easily.

I propose, with our editor's agreement, to start a "Do You Remember When.....?" page in the Messenger. If you have a memory or story about someone, email or mail your story to me, and we will see if it brings more stories to share.

How about if we start with Frank Aldous – a particular favourite of mine. Do you remember when.....?

From a Gardeners Notebook, January 2023

- "O come on Mary, you don't want us out there in January?"
- "Sure thing"
- "It's a total waste of time! I'd rather be indoors, in the warm. Anyway, I put my garden to bed in November, and I shan't be out again until a week before Easter" This is the opinion of too many people; but I would like to get you to change your mind, and see that you derive pleasure from your "Winter Garden". Here are a few facts and suggestions towards that aim.

Mornings are best, before lunch – take a late lunch if the weather is kind. It does tend to be better earlier in the day than later at this time of year. Your garden looks and is better in reality than through your windows. Make a real effort to be ahead of the game by the middle of March – you will really notice the benefit later in the season. Proceed with care on occasions, gently rake leaves away with your fingers, rather than going hard at it with a heavy rake, and damaging the tips of your bulbs.

The garden will remain approximately the same for three months, or more. You could not say this at any other time of the year. Remove any perennial weeds, especially those with tap-roots; dig them out with a large fork, making sure that you get all the root. Brambles too: dig or mattock them out. You must find the crown, or they will be back. Enjoy the beauty in the frost; watch how it will change the hue on leaves of evergreens; you may even see shades of red on euonymus.

Prompt points – you may care to protect your broad beans, if they are through now. Check your outdoor propagation and make sure that it is not too wet, and that mushy leaves are not spoiling herbaceous plants. Prune your rhododendron and cut out any dead wood. Time to shape amelanchier again.

Like me, I am sure that you have observed last autumn as very long lasting. The leaves of oaks, limes and beech trees still cling to the twigs. Why not keep a notebook yourself – record rainy days, frost patterns and much more: another dimension to your garden and the general appreciation of our natural history. Watch little birds, such as wrens sparrows or robins – they will looking to pair: the cycle continues.
