July 2023 Parish Letter from Fr Ben

Being Christian can be difficult, mainly because of other Christians! News stories arise about how Churches are getting things terribly wrong. Some Christians, especially in the USA, have embraced a form of nationalism which annexes Christianity; uses the words of the Bible to justify the exertion of control over politics. Exclusionary policies have arisen in the USA, driven by wrong-headed interpretations that defy the teaching of Jesus. Refugees and immigrants are shunned; Transgender people vilified; equity for LGBT+ folk eroded; the rights of women to govern their own bodies in terms of pregnancy removed. In Uganda, LGBT+ folk have been effectively outlawed, with some backwards looking laws resulting in a potential death penalty. We still hear stories of abuses in the Church of England, and those in charge of safeguarding getting it horribly wrong.

It seems as if some Christians are dragging humanity backwards rather than continuing with humanity on its journey forwards. For most of us, this devolving into spiteful, barbaristic exclusion is abhorrent. How can we, the congregations of Holy Innocents and St Peter's churches possibly, hand on heart, invite you along to our faith community in such times? What does it say about our faith?

Some churches believe that the Bible should be followed as if it is without flaw, interpreted only in the way it appears to speak, like a Haynes motor manual, or a rulebook to a game, that if you follow the rules correctly, that's how you will 'win'. We believe this is wrong. St Peter's and Holy Innocents knows that there is far more to the Christian faith - following rules on face value isn't what Jesus taught. We understand that the Bible isn't an instruction or science manual, but a collection of ancient stories and poems and accounts and songs that speak about the human experience of the divine, both extraordinary and everyday.

And they evoke in us a far deeper truth than the idea that 'you shouldn't do this, you shouldn't think that, you have to do xyz'. The Bible carries

within it the spirit of the living God, our creator, that seeks to guide us towards participating in *love*. Yes, knowing that we *are* loved, but also knowing that God *IS* the loving, God *IS* the process of loving. Being Christian isn't about being perfect, or more virtuous, or always doing the right thing, or being the 'right' sort of person, or knowing when to stand up or cross oneself, or getting on the coffee rota, or having a firm and unassailable faith – it's about being there, to be listened to, to be counted, to be part of, to be welcomed, to be human, to be accepted and loved.

This is what guides us as a faith community – trusting in the love of God, and the process of loving others – being present to them, seeing the divine in them, listening to them, welcoming them and accepting them, and sharing the signs of God's loving action both in worship and in the world, joining with others to see the divine right here and now, together finding a life bursting with joy right here and now, finding the vitality of life right here and now – not as if our lives are some sort of test for after we die, but for LIVING NOW!

I know that, looking at many Christians, you might conclude that the Christian faith belongs firmly in the past, that it is dying. But I tell you, it is ALIVE in Thurston & Great Barton, yearning to transform lives with love.



From a Gardeners Notebook, July 2023

How were your borders in June? Height and colour with delphiniums, the perfume and beauty of roses. Peonies and honeysuckle. Why do all these wonderful things happen at once? The rewards for all our efforts and care reach their peak for approximately two weeks in June. Do not be despondent and think that the garden is nothing for the rest of the year. Over the last three years I have made suggestions for planting, and extending the season; also I encourage winter gardening. If you are clever enough the area around your home can have interest 365 days of the year.

Cut back hardy geranims, also centaurea; these will flower again. Open spaces, clear of daffodil and tulip foliage can be planted with annuals, cosmos and cleome, as recommended for spring planting. Cleome will grace your garden from July to September and attract interest and questions from visitors.

Whilst writing such a column on a continous basis it is inevitable that information gets repeated. The gardeners calendar is cyclical.

Propagation in July and August – sterilise your pans.

Time to enjoy new potatoes, broad beans, and beetroot. At the end of the month, picking fruit and making jam-= - I am down to my last pot of plum.

Pruning – Philadelphus –after flowering. Wisteria – side shoots and ramblers. If you have not clipped your box, you had better do that too. Remember, we prune for three reasons. 1) Horticultural correctness – and care of the plant. 2) To give it good shape. 3) The safety of people.

Lastly – watch the temperature in your greenhouse if you still have plants in it, they may burn if you are not careful.

I hope that you have found lots of interesting things in "Open Gardens". Don't forget to recycle grey water.

One of my favourite things.....

is hearing stories of local history. These stories make a place come alive for me, and often bring the people of those past times alive, too. Every student at Great Barton Primary School (sorry, Academy - sometimes I live in the past) learns about Bertuna, and the story of Lord Bunbury and his horse Diomed, who won the first Derby.

My husband Jim was a historian, a natural teacher and mesmerising story teller. He made dull history come alive. So it was natural that our first outing after we settled in Great Barton was to the Abbey Gardens in Bury St Edmunds. His purpose was particularly to take us to the site of the Abbey ruins. He showed us the tablets on the ruins which record where the Barons of England met at Bury in 1214 to swear before the High Alter to force King John to grant the Magna Carta. With mental pictures of great knights and their large cortege of minions, destriers rearing and stamping, armoury shining, sergeants bellowing orders, weary foot soldiers covered in dust scurrying to make camp, and priests of the Abbey offering hospitality to the Barons, Jim told us that this meeting had a direct impact on us and "all English-speaking people as the source of our Constitutional liberties" [from Suffolk Summer by John Appleby, 1948].

From Bury St Edmunds, through the Magna Carta to the writing of the United States Constitution - Jim thrilled his family with the history of our new home and our strong connection with it. Our daughter, Stacy, recently incorporated this connection into her final paper for her Master's Degree to strengthen her own teaching of history in Washington State. Great stories from great teachers to inspire those who come next.

With this background, it is natural that every guest who ever stayed with us was "treated" to a tour of Bury St Edmunds with emphasis on the Abbey and the Barons of 1214. In the 1990s we had a couple from Montana who were travelling with a choir, singing in several places in England. I don't remember exactly how it happened, but this young couple stayed with us for a couple of nights at the end of their tour. The wife was singing, and her husband was along for the holiday. He was getting tired after several repeats of the same concert, so Jim offered to show him around Bury, while the concert was on. He jumped at the offer. As they walked into the Abbey Gardens, Jim began telling him "The Bury St Edmunds Story, and the Abbey ruins came into sight. The fellow stopped short, moaned, and said, "Oh no! Not AOPR!!" Jim looked around wildly, completely off his

stride. "Where? What? AOPR? What's that?" Shoulders slumped, the exhausted American said, "Another Old Pile of Rocks. I can't take any more. Can we just go for a pint?"

Even great teachers and storytellers have to admit failure sometimes, but I'm told that a pint of Green King Bitter heals the hurt.


Calling all history and photography lovers!
