#### March 2023 Parish Letter

If there is a zeitgeist, a defining spirit or mood of this particular period of history as shown by the ideas and beliefs of this time, it is a zeitgeist rooted in fear. Fear is an especially useful tool in politics and the manufacture of consent. It is a powerful tool of propaganda that can be used to cut off sections of the public from the alternative views of any particular policy. Appeals to fear seek to build support by instilling anxieties and panic in the general population.

We are all susceptible to the appeal to fear, the effect of which leads us almost inevitably to consenting to various courses of action that may have previously been beyond our better judgement. Some of the modern examples of these appeals to fear will be familiar – we may still be in their clutches.

Some of them we carry with us because we believe them to be reasonable and wise. We all quite rightly fell to the appeal to fear of the Covid 19 virus – this is how the lockdowns were able to be observed as well as they were. However, this fear was used to good advantage by those who wished to profit from that fear - £37 billion was given to the flawed Test and Trace scheme. £4 billion was given to companies to provide PPE which turned out to be useless. Our fears were well justified, but the fear drove people to make bad decisions under the pressure.

We have been subjected to campaigns of fear of migrants and refugees to this country – we have sadly been encouraged with words of fear by our own government, Home Secretary Suella Braverman referring to refugees as an 'invasion', inflammatory language designed to instil fear so as to manufacture consent for extreme and dehumanising policies, such as shipping refugees to Rwanda as standard practice. Fear of difference – the increasing rhetoric surrounding transgender people, that they are somehow a danger to society, contributed to the tragic murder of 16 year old trans girl Brianna Ghey, simply because of who she was.

All of these appeals to fear weave a narrative to all those that hear them—that what we have, our resources, our way of living, our health, our

freedom, our identities, our world as we know it will be taken away from us.

And so we worry. We worry about our health. We worry about the foreigner. We worry about not having enough. We worry about change. And can any of you by worrying add a single hour to your span of life? We worry about all of these things chiefly because we are *told* to worry about them. And who tells us we should worry about them? And how do we hear that we should worry about them?

The Bible says, in various ways, 'Do not be afraid' - many times! - Do not be afraid!

Christians put their trust in God. Because anxious, worrying people can be divided and controlled by forces other than God. Fearful people can be divided and then taught to fear each other. Fearing each other leads to conflict, segregation, isolation and destruction. I quote a wise person who said, 'Fear leads to anger. Anger leads to hatred. Hatred leads to the dark side' – Yes, I know this was Yoda from Star Wars, but it also happens to be true!.

Wherever we are made to feel fearful about our future, wherever we are led to worry about the latest thing that we're told to be afraid of, stop. Lift your hearts and minds and souls to God, cast your worries and anxieties into God's hands, where you are nestled in the protective embrace as of a mother enveloping her children in loving and gentle care. Let go of worrying about tomorrow, with its phantoms and dread portents imagined by the worm-tongue whispers that meet our ears. And know that, with God, all shall be well and all shall be well, and all manner of things shall be well.



## **Churchyard Matters**

#### **Dear Parishioners**

May we please draw your attention to the way the churchyard is used, what is permissible and what is prohibited.

#### For safety reasons:

No glass containers please. If placed on headstone they fall over and break. Broken glass is then hidden in the grass and poses an injury hazard to others. Also, in winter, the water in the container freezes causing expansion - the glass breaks resulting again in an injury hazard. The Churchwardens reserve the right to dispose of any glass containers found in the churchyard.

Loose headstones will be made safe, and where possible relatives informed.

No plastic flowers should be placed on graves. Silk flowers are permissible.

#### Care of the Churchyard:

Always leave a watering can with water in it if there is no place to hang it. It then won't blow away!

Put wreaths, oasis, flowerpots, and paper in the grey bin. Only compostable flowers in the brown bin. Dog litter only in the grey bin. All Crosses to be removed once a headstone is in place.

Please be respectful of other graves. Do not encroach on the grave of others loved ones by putting too many flowers, flower boxes and objects around your loved ones grave. Please respect the tradition and serenity of these places of rest, keeping adornments to a minimum and in keeping with the surroundings.



#### From a Gardeners Notebook, March 2023

This month's article is on "Hedges and Trees." One or two suggestions were passed on to me by an old work colleague, a true "Suffolk Boy" and a wonderful back woods man, my thanks go to him.

Great Barton is an excellent area to observe as many people have planned both beautiful and practical examples.

Why do we plant hedges?

To make and mark boundaries, to enhance our properties, as wind brakes to warm planting areas, a backdrop for borders and absorb noise. (Laurels are excellent for this purpose)

#### **Planting**

March is a good time for planting. If possible, prepare the ground by digging a trench and add natural or purchased compost, work in well. Remember to put up a line to get a good straight or curved line as you wish. Plant five small trees to a metre in a "W" shape. Trim routes before planting, do not be afraid to cut back the hedge hard in its first year, as this will produce a better hedge eventually. We want the hedge to be wider at the base not leggy.

#### Now planting a tree

When planting a tree, a very good tip is to introduce a pipe at the place of planting then you will be able to water the routes where it is most needed. As you stake your tree, secure it about halfway up: then as the wind blows, the top, good root growth will be encouraged at the bottom.

In this country we have about 35 native types of trees, see how many you can think of, lime and yew two to get you started. In our own area, hornbeam is one of our natives therefore a fine example to choose for a specimen tree or hedging.

Enjoy the pleasures of early spring, happy planting.
